As the end of term draws near, we wanted to take the opportunity to reflect on what a fantastic term it has been for the Academy. Students and staff have had many brilliant trips and experiences including cultural capital trips to London, literature lectures in Birmingham, and various sporting fixtures across the region. In particular, we commemorated Hamza Alrimi - a year on from his passing - with a football match, awarding the Alrimi cup.

We have celebrated the achievements of individual students through our student GEM awards. We have recognised winners of the Christmas card competition and those who have make significant contributions to student council meetings. We have celebrated staff achievements through our staff GEM awards and letters of commendation from our Governing Board. As always, we are incredibly proud of what the members of our Sidney Stringer family achieve.

Looking back on 2023, there is much to celebrate as the year draws to a close. In February, we were visited by Ofsted and graded Outstanding 3 areas: personal development, leadership and management, and sixth form provision. 




During Anti-bullying week the Learning Mentor team created a kindness tree and asked students around school to write some positive messages/advice for students who have experienced bullied.

HERBERT ART GALLERY -SOCIOLOGY TRIP

All of our GCSE and A-level Sociology students visited the Herbert Art Gallery this term. We looked around the History of Coventry exhibition and considered how changes to our city over time can be evidence of many sociological concepts.

Students looked at how the opening of Coventry Free Library in 1601, and the introduction of the NHS in 1948, changed the lives of working-class people. They also examined how advances in technology and politics changed life in the country, the city and the lives of individual families, from the medieval period to modern day.

Students listened to real stories of women from Coventry and their experiences of marriage and the social expectations of women during the 1950's, they read about how immigration has shaped our city and they considered how dishwashers and TV's changed family life for good, and they found evidence for the emergence of childhood overtime.


Year 10 have been making 3D architectural forms.

To begin the year, our first DRIVE week was held in October and the Head Student team worked in various ways to demonstrate the importance of determination in our school lives. In our assemblies on determination, students heard from former Head student Yassin, who shared how he displayed determination to get accepted into the University of Oxford. We also ran a food collection for the Trussel Trust food bank, and the Healthy Minds council worked closely with Melisa, our Deputy Head student, to improve mental health support for all students. As we move closer to our second DRIVE week, centered around respect, we are collaborating with the eco-council to promote respect for the environment. As Christmas approaches, we are also working towards creating packages and hampers for children. To support this, we held a samosa sale for our teachers, where we were able to raise money for the Christmas hampers.

With our weekly meetings with Mrs Court and meetings with the ALT, we have been able to collect feedback from students about what they would like for the school and propose ideas to the staff. We have also had support from our new Student Leadership Team, whom we have recently appointed after conducting interviews with all candidates. I can say that the process was very difficult, due to the sheer capability and skill of all our candidates, and I firmly believe that this year's SLT has much promise and will bring a lot to the school. As representatives of the academy, Donte and I spoke at the school's Open Evenings, where I was able to share my personal experience of coming to this school as an external student and being welcomed into the community that is Sidney Stringer Academy.

Aside from working with the Head Student team, as Year 13 students, we have also been balancing our student leadership duties with preparing for our post-18 journeys. In mid-November, I and other students were able to visit Keble College at the University of Oxford, where we were guided on the admissions process and experienced a taster lecture. Having sat in a history lecture, I was thrilled with the depth of the information, and we were able to handle real newspapers from 1851, comparing them to current newspapers and media of today. To further aid our university applications and help us make informed decisions, we have had universities such as Warwick, Aston, and Oxford Brookes University come in and talk to us about different pathways and student life.

Being on the Head student team and working with Donte, Melisa, and Moussa has been a pleasure so far, and I hope that the work we have done over the last term has positively impacted our school. I sincerely believe that the rest of the year looks promising, with support from the staff and student body.

The students were asked about their roles and responsibilities, what they like about our academy and things that they would develop. Students represented their peers so well and we are very proud of them!

On the next page, Layla speaks about her role, the importance of student voice and how we celebrate our diverse community:

What is Student Voice?

Student Voice refers to the unique perspectives, opinions, and input that students contribute to the decision-making processes and overall functioning of educational institutions. It emphasizes the idea that students should have the opportunity to express their thoughts, ideas, and concerns and that their input is valuable in shaping their educational experience. Student Voice encompasses a range of activities and mechanisms that enable students to participate actively in the decisions that affect their learning environment

Why should we use students?

Children and young people can offer unique perspectives on what it is like to be a pupil at their school; involving them in decision-making can create meaningful change and better academic outcomes, as well as facilitating a sense of empowerment and inclusion.

For decades, special educators have recorded educational goals identified by students and their families on the Individualized Education Program (IEP). This process of listening to students and supporting their ideas is just one example of the larger concepts of student voice. In an era of increased accountability and measured student outcomes, student voice represents a growing movement in education. Instead of a teacher-directed approach to learning, students play an active and equal role in planning, learning, and leading their classroom instruction and contributing to the development of school practices and policies. This significant philosophical shift requires all stakeholders to embrace the belief that there is something to learn from every individual regardless of age, culture, socioeconomic status, or other qualifying factors.

How does this benefit students?

- It creates an efficient environment where schools are partly run by students themselves. This creates a sense of responsibility from each individual who is part of smaller panels, such as the Student Leadership Team at Sidney Stringer. Here, any students who are willing can apply to take part in improving and changing the school for the better. Anybody on this panel receives a different lanyard so younger students know whom to ask for directions around, advice for subjects, and suggestions to change the school.
- Students are left with a sense of pride in their role, which ultimately creates more importance for their education. As well as this, it creates pride that we can voice our own opinions and possibly shape the schools' features to benefit other students and staff daily
- Students feel like their opinions are validated and important, which is important for the mental health and selfesteem of pupils, as a whole team of people are willing to listen to your thoughts, feelings, and opinions.
- Giving suggestions for improvements is a repeating key theme throughout society (such as employment) so developing these skills early on is beneficial
- It also gives students a sense of responsibility that they can help people further, which shapes and creates character, which is necessary for the modern world (ie, building connections)
- It creates confidence in one's feelings and sharing these feelings is crucial

Building confidence, self-esteem, and opinions, is a form of building character which is so essential for life. Schools encourage this through the system which puts students ahead in their development. Schools also encourage diversity and individualism.

Why is this important?

This is so important as each individual deserves the ability to use their voice to shape, change and create a better foundation for students in the educational community. As well as the fact that our own opinions can affect other people, they can also affect ourselves.

What is diversity?

Diversity is everything that makes people different from each other. This includes many different factors: race, ethnicity, gender, sexual orientation, socio-economic status, ability, age, religious belief, or political conviction.

Why is celebrating diversity important?

- Cultural Competence: Exposure to diverse cultures, perspectives, and backgrounds helps students develop cultural competence. This means they can better understand, appreciate, and interact with people from different ethnic, cultural, and social backgrounds
- Preparation for the Global World: In an increasingly interconnected and globalized world, it's essential for students to be prepared to work and collaborate with individuals from diverse backgrounds. Embracing diversity in schools helps students develop the skills needed for success in a global society
- Reducing Stereotypes and Prejudice:
 Celebrating diversity challenges
 stereotypes and prejudices by
 fostering understanding and empathy.
 When students learn about different
 cultures and experiences, it breaks
 down stereotypes and promotes a more
 inclusive and tolerant community
- Promoting Inclusivity and Belonging: A diverse and inclusive school environment ensures that all students feel valued, respected, and included. This sense of belonging is crucial for student's emotional well-being and academic success
- Enhancing Creativity and Innovation:
 Diversity fosters creativity and
 innovation. When individuals from
 different backgrounds come together,
 they bring a variety of ideas,
 experiences, and approaches to
 problem-solving, leading to more
 innovative solutions
- Building Positive Relationships:
 Celebrating diversity helps students
 build positive relationships with their
 peers. It fosters a sense of community
 and encourages students to learn from
 each other, building friendships that
 transcend cultural and social
 differences

How do schools celebrate diversity?

- Cultural Awareness Events: Schools often organize cultural awareness events that showcase the traditions, customs, and contributions of various ethnic and cultural groups. This may include international festivals, cultural fairs, or heritage months dedicated to specific cultures
- Multicultural Education: Incorporating diverse perspectives into the curriculum helps students learn about different cultures, histories, and traditions. This can include literature, history, and social studies lessons that highlight the achievements and experiences of people from various backgrounds.
- Guest Speakers and Presentations: Inviting speakers from diverse backgrounds to share their experiences can provide students with valuable insights. This might include individuals from different cultural, religious, or ethnic backgrounds who can speak about their heritage, career paths, or life experiences
- Diverse Literature and Resources: Including books, textbooks, and other educational resources that represent a variety of cultures and perspectives helps students see themselves in the materials they study. It also fosters a sense of belonging for students from different backgrounds
- Diversity Clubs and Organizations:
 Establishing clubs or organizations focused on diversity and inclusion can provide a space for students to come together, share their experiences, and plan activities that celebrate diversity
- Community Engagement: Schools can collaborate with local community organizations to create opportunities for students to engage with diverse communities outside of the school environment. This could involve field trips, community service projects, or partnerships with local cultural institutions.
- Inclusive Policies and Practices: Implementing policies that promote inclusivity, such as anti-bullying measures and non-discrimination policies, helps create a safe and welcoming environment for all students.


ASTON VILLA WOMEN VS DURHAM WOMEN






MISS MURPHY'S DESIGN NEWS








YEAR 8 BIODIVERSITY PROJECT






ART COUNCIL



















ART WORK ON LOAN

Mental Health in Schools Team (MHST) Tips For Wellness:

DIGITAL DETOX

Technology has become a normal part of our day-to-day lives and is widely beneficial; from being used as an alarm to wake us up in the morning, to helping us stay connected with family, and watching our favourite programme wherever we are in the world! However, prolonged use of technology can increase stress levels and have an unhealthy impact on our mental wellbeing.

A digital detox can help to improve sleep quality, reduce stress and anxiety, enhance productivity, increase creativity, and improve self-awareness.

Our tips for digital detox:

- 1- Phone free zones. Keeping phones out of certain rooms may help you to stick to your detox plan. This will remove the temptation to reach for your phone/mobile device and it allows you to enjoy your space away from technology!
 - 2- 30 minute rule. Try to swap using your phone before bed for a screen-free activity instead! This should be for at least the last 30 minutes of the day. The blue light from screens tricks our brain into thinking it is daytime, which disrupts the production of melatonin (the hormone we need to feel sleepy!) Activities could be reading, mindful colouring, tidying, journaling, playing a musical instrument, board games, meditation, completing a puzzle, or self-care.
 - 3- Take regular screen breaks. Stepping away from the screen helps us to balance our digital and real-world lives. This will also increase our self-awareness, productivity and overall happiness.

Free Holiday Clubs, **Experiences and Food**



This Christmas school holiday, children and young people who are eligible for benefits-related free school meals (or who meet our other eligibility criteria*) can benefit from an amazing range of free holiday clubs, experiences. This booklet shows some of the wide collection of activities

available, when and where they are being held, and the age ranges. A meal is provided at all clubs on each of the days they are running. Check our webpages for to view all the activities available this winter.

How do I book?

Families who are eligible will receive a letter in the post inviting them to book. In this letter, you will have your child's HAF code, which will be a reference number on all your bookings.

There are just a few steps needed to book your child onto HAF activities and experiences. These are:

- 1. Make sure you've got a Coventry City Council My Account set up www.myaccount.coventry.gov.uk
- 2. Have your HAF code ready
- 3. Add your child to the booking system
- 4. Decide what to book go to our HAF webpages for more detailed information about activities
- 5. Book your child onto the activities

When you've done this, you'll receive a confirmation email. Just contact the provider if your child has any additional needs, or requirements. When it's time for an activity, just turn up and enjoy!

How can I get help?

If you do not have access to the internet, you can call our Customer Contact team on 08085 834 333 for help to register your bookings over the phone. If you need help setting up your online account or using the booking system, contact our Early Help team on 08008 870 545. Alternatively, you can drop into one of our Family Hubs or Libraries across the city. Visit www.coventry.gov.uk/directory/115/warm-welcome-venues to see where they are based.

How does it work?

Each eligible child has a total of four credits which are used to book activities. Some clubs are open to book one day at a time, whilst others require children to attend every day that week. Under each club description, you will find information on whether you can book one day at a time, or if you must book a block of multiple days at a time. The number in the red circle next to the session names indicates how many credits each session is worth.

Coventry experiences are indicated with (a) and are limited to one per child.

Some activities will offer spaces to younger siblings under the age of 5, and some require parents/carers to attend with children. This information is also shown under each club.



Prior to activities, we encourage you to work with our providers to complete the 'All About Me' form. Through this form, providers can record useful information about your child's needs to ensure that activities can be made as inclusive as possible for all those who attend.

Nutritious food is at the heart of the HAF programme. That's why each of the activities has a free meal included.

Lots of support is available from many different organisations to help you manage the cost of food pressures.

Accessing food support

Food Banks and Social Supermarkets are there to support households in need. Food Banks work on a referral basis and can provide emergency food parcels. 


